Homer Gruenther, 1952 (2) [Homer is at Eisenhower's Denver headquarters; escorting Mrs. Doud to the dog races; Jim Black; Army recalls Ike's Army staff; attempt to coordinate Republican Party efforts with Citizens for Eisenhower; Chicago convention; pre-convention campaigning; Homer's attempts to get involved in the Eisenhower campaign; Sen. Fred Seaton visits Eisenhower in Paris; primary elections]

Homer Gruenther, 1953 (1) [Bermuda Conference, Dec. 1953, British and French don't get along well behind the scenes; Emmet Hughes as a speech writer; C. D. Jackson; status of forces agreement]

Homer Gruenther, 1953 (2) [Senator Taft seriously ill; Rosenberg Case; identifies C. D. Jackson and Emmet Hughes as authors of "Chance for Peace" Speech, April 16, 1953; Al Gruenther, trip to U.S., bridge; Al doesn't recommend people for political appointments; President has luncheons for members of Congress; Jerry Persons; Homer seeking position in Eisenhower White House]

Homer Gruenther, 1954 (1) [Crusade for Freedom group visits Europe; Randall wants Al Gruenther to testify on trade program; Edgar Bergan visits White House and helps Homer prepare for Christmas play; Montgomery visits; political predictions for 1954 elections]

Homer Gruenther, 1954 (2) [trip to Europe cancelled for political reasons; H. L. Hunt to visit Paris; Gruenthers to attend meeting at Camp David, June 11-12; tennis]

2 Homer Gruenther, 1954 (3) [trips; invitations; "New Look" strategy; Senators Bridges and Symington visit Paris; "gag" pulled on Persons at Staff Meeting]

Homer Gruenther, 1955 (1) [Kevin McCann caught speeding; story re conversation between DDE and Molotov at Geneva comparing freedom in U.S. and Russia; President's work well-regulated; plans to run again]

Homer Gruenther, 1955 (2)(3) [NATO and President's popularity in Europe; Gen. Ridgway; meetings]

Homer Gruenther, 1956 (1) [Senator Aiken holding up confirmation of Ellsworth Bunker as ambassador to India, A. Gruenther scheduled to replace Bunker as head of American Red Cross; election results; Howard Hughes; timing of release of announcement of Gruenther's retirement; H-bomb issue in 56 campaign; NATO Military Committee Meeting, Oct. 17-22, brief description of each member of the

committee; predictions on which states will go for Eisenhower or Stevenson, Oct. 1956]

Homer Gruenther, 1956 (2) [comments on campaign; negotiations re Red Cross position; Howard Hughes, possible TWA position; Homer Gruenther and wife, Elizabeth, to travel in Europe, July 22-Aug. 16; Alfred to testify on foreign aid program on June 21]

Homer Gruenther, 1956 (3) [Ellsworth Bunker, head of Red Cross, wants to know if Alfred would be interested in his job, May 1956; visit to U.S. and speaking invitations]

Homer Gruenther, 1956 (4) [V.P. Nixon; Arthur Hill wants Alfred to be president of International Telegraph and Telephone; announcement of Alfred's retirement; new Soviet jet airliner; ownership of Paris daily Le Figaro]

McGrath, Raymond E., 1947-1953 (1) [family matters; Gruenther's mother-in-law and two daughters flee Soviet zone of Germany]

McGrath, Raymond E., 1947-1953 (2) [comments on political strategy for 1952 campaign; Anti-Gruenther Society; schedule for trip to U.S., April 1952]

McGrath, Raymond E., 1947-1953 (3) [family matters; Gruenther alerted about visitor from Omaha; some tongue-in-cheek correspondence]

McGrath, Raymond E., 1954-1956 (1)-(3) [Al Gruenther's retirement announcement; family matters; Status of Forces Treaty; social events; speaking engagements; tennis; results of 1954 election; Sen. Hruska opposed foreign aid bill; Alfred comments on coming from an anti-British Nebraska community and people who propose "screwball projects;" pro- and anti-Gruenther Societies; Ak-Sar-Ben; Trading with the Enemy Act]

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
